### When to use HAVE TO

We use **have to** when something is necessary and you have no choice.

Ex. The circus is not for free so we have to pay \$5 each.

Tomorrow is my long exam so, I have to study.

Use **don't have to** when something is NOT necessary or not required.

Ex. I don't have to clean my house on weekdays.

Mrs. Smith doesn't have to send her son to school because his already 10 years.
