




At the end of the lesson, the student will be able to:

Read the article:

The time will come when my body will lie upon a white sheet neatly tucked under four corners of a mattress in a hospital busily occupied with the living and the dying. If, by chance, you wish to remember me, do it with a kind deed or word to someone who needs you. If you do all I have asked, I will live forever.
